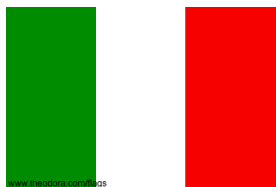

While it is generally assumed that the wine making activity and skills learned by inmates would have a positive impact on recidivism, there has not been any effort to measure its impact on the inmates.

READINGS TO GUARANTEE AN UNCOMFORTABLE NIGHT

In order to develop a better understanding of current crises in some parts of the world and our failures to contain them, it often helps to look at past history. The current turmoil in Somalia and the Sudan, for example, can be better understood by reading real life accounts of the jihads and related conflicts which occurred there 90-120 years ago.

Many of the written accounts are no longer copyrighted and can be downloaded/read in pdf format. **Joseph Ohrwalder**, an Austrian cleric who was held captive and enslaved by the Mohamed Ahmed, the Mahdi of the Sudan, documented his ten years in captivity with the assistance of Sir Francis Reginald Wingate, an adjutant general of Military Intelligence of the Egyptian Army and later a general and officer in the British Army who received numerous awards and decorations for his achievements. The riveting and graphic story of Ohrlander's captivity and his description of the persona of the Mahdi, provide interesting insights into a "Jihadist" whose ultimate goal was to spread Islam everywhere in the latter part of the 19th century.

The current problems in the Sudan are not new and the region has been the site of conflicts for centuries. The government of Sudan has been accused of using both police and military to engage in genocidal activities. It is interesting that in 1997, during a conversation about the needs of the police in the Sudan, the General over the Sudanese police stated that he needed heavy weapons and tanks. These equipment needs are not associated with the public safety function of police in general and may shed additional light on the role of the police in the Sudan.

The French Foreign Legion (*Légion Étrangère*) currently has about 7699 Legionnaires from 136 countries. Legionnaires are given the toughest assignments and also provide the honor guard for the French president. The legion was formed on 10 March 1838 and has distinguished itself in battles and armed conflicts around the world.

Police Office for Sale

Police in Japan typically serve in a Koban, a small police post with 5-6 officers, at a regional or central police station with many officers or division, or in a Chuzaisho. Chuzaishos are single family residences with an adjoining or attached "police" office. Married officers with their spouses can be assigned to one of the Chuzaishos and the officer/family live in the residence free of charge. The officer works out of the adjoining office during the day and is responsible for a specific geographic area that can be primarily residential, commercial, or both. Chuzaisho officers are integrated in the community, participate in most community events, serve as school crossing guards, respond to and investigate criminal incidents, and also routinely check on the elderly in the community.

Fiscal problems, however, have not left Japanese police unscathed and some Chuzaishos are up for sale. Below one such
