



# The Downtown Degree Program

(Classes held in the downstairs training room of the Fresno Police Dept. Annex)

A new set of two classes is scheduled to begin in April:

County and city employees with 60 units or prior college coursework that is transferable to CSU Fresno or those who are close to meeting the transfer requirements, may register for the upcoming downtown classes. The admissions process is separate and can be concurrent with the downtown classes. Dr. Schweizer and a representative of the CSU Fresno Evaluations office will be at the FPD Annex downstairs training room from about 1700-1800 on Monday, 26 February 2007 to meet

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with current and prospective students to discuss the admissions and transfer. More detailed information on the downtown degree program and transfer requirements for admission to CSU Fresno can be found at downtown program web page.

The cost for courses in the downtown program is \$150 per unit, or \$450 per three unit course. Payment can be made via credit card, personal check, or money order.

Employees from governmental agencies other than the city or county of Fresno can join the downtown program on a case by case basis, primarily depending on available classroom space.

## Downtown Graduate Program

Numerous inquiries have been received about a downtown graduate program in Criminology. With the second cohort currently completing their B.S. degree requirements and more individuals expressing an interest in, and qualifying for, a graduate degree program, such a program is becoming more feasible for the near future. We are also looking at customizing the course offerings to provide a greater focus on C.J.
